The Contributions of Sigmund Freud

- **Life History:** Key turning points—parents age difference, parenting styles), early move, death of sibling, mentors(lost job, hypnosis), cocaine, private practice
- **Theory:** unconscious motives, blocked stages of development linked to deviant/criminal behavior.
- **Practice:** Psychoanalysis
- **Method:** Case Study (Bean-Bayogg and Paul Lozanno—repressed memories of abuse)
